Dear Future WYCF Board Members – 25 Years Hence;


Over 400 years elapsed between the invention of the quill pen and the pencil; 100 years between the pencil and the typewriter; 50 years between the typewriter and computer; and 30 years between the computer and the floppy disk (remember those?). These days, we are hard pressed to keep on top of major advances in written communications that seem to emerge every few months. I cannot even hazard a guess at the pace of change you will be faced with in 25 years!



During my time on the board, I have witnessed incredible change and growth as we have faithfully pursued a mission of connecting people who care with causes that matter to build a better Wyoming. In our early years WYCF granted out just over \$100,000. In 2014 the Foundation distributed over \$4.5 million. It took ten years for us to reach \$10 million in charitable assets; we now exceed \$100 million.

I find great comfort and satisfaction in the fact that community foundations are designed to be living organisms, fundamentally equipped to evolve in response to changing needs and norms, and therefore hardwired for continued success. 25 years from now, if an original organization or need that a donor supported ceases to exist, the Foundation will have the ability to redirect to another organization or community need as close as possible to that donor's intent. I feel assured that you will honor our donors' wishes in our shared mission of building a better Wyoming.

I have enjoyed being a part of the early building years of this vital statewide organization. Our continuing goal will be to honor the WYCF's past while positioning future staff and board members to achieve exponential growth in the ability to make a real difference to Wyoming's communities.

WYOMING COMMUNITY FOUNDATION:

A History of Cultivating Community

he Wyoming Community Foundation's success was cultivated in the hands of a group of forward-thinking people with big ideas and tenacity. They recognized that financial stability proved the biggest hurdle for struggling nonprofits and that a community foundation could help eliminate that hurdle. These individuals were instrumental to establishing the Foundation, and two of them continue to make an impact today.

A Game-Changer for the Foundation: Lollie Benz Plank and the LEK Unrestricted Endowment Fund

Lollie Benz Plank has said, "The most important money the Wyoming Community Foundation has is the kind that can help make a statement in the community, to launch efforts and work on projects that can be replicated." In 1998 Plank's decision to establish the LEK Unrestricted Endowment Fund did just that - giving the Foundation the freedom to make more impactful gifts where and when they were needed.

The fund also provided WYCF sustainability, helping the Foundation grow into the thriving organization it is today with assets of over \$100 million. This sort of success was something Plank dreamed for Wyoming. Her generosity has helped make it possible.

Dedication to the Foundation: John F. Freeman

John F. Freeman's term as Wyoming Community Foundation president ended in 2003, but his expertise and knowledge continue to be invaluable to WYCF. He is a resource and a sounding board, and he believes the Foundation is uniquely positioned to create impact.

"WYCF doesn't solve problems, it makes it possible for problems to be solved," says Freeman. "The Foundation has the luxury of flexibility and can underwrite experiments that can be enormously helpful long-term." This view of the Foundation, and Freeman's passion for nonprofits, is what helped make WYCF such a success. It is also a principle that continues to guide the Foundation today.



Discretionary Funds

Discretionary funds, or unrestricted funds, allow WYCF to address a broad range of local needs, including those that often cannot be anticipated when a gift is made. Unrestricted funds give us the ability to support long-term solutions; respond quickly to emergencies; and meet changing social, cultural, educational or environmental needs throughout Wyoming.

Giving Comes Full Circle

ies run deep in small towns. Community members take time to celebrate successes, and drop everything to support one another when tragedy occurs. Amy Gross knows this personally. In 2011, Amy's husband Bryan, a deputy with the Converse County Sheriff's Department, attempted to rescue a young girl from the North Platte River. Recent floods had made the river swift and strong. The girl was saved, but Bryan didn't make it.

The loss hit the community hard, but the outpouring of support Amy and the rest of Bryan's family received was incredible. "I can't say enough," says Amy. "Wyoming is just an amazingly different place." Kind words and donations began coming in and the Gross' decided to honor Bryan by giving back to the communities he loved.



The family found the Wyoming Community Foundation to be a perfect fit for a fund in his honor. WYCF would take care of the "overwhelming amount of work" that would have gone into setting up a private foundation or nonprofit. This allowed the family to focus on the causes they cared most about – one of which was law enforcement.

"Bryan lived for being a police officer," says Amy, "and he dreamed of being in the K-9 Unit." His dream became a reality when he and his dog, Gus, were chosen to serve as the K-9 taskforce.

After Bryan passed away Gus stayed with Amy, providing her wonderful companionship, but also leaving a gap in the K-9 department at the sheriff's department.

Because of tremendous support received from the community, in 2014 the Bryan Gross Memorial Fund was able to grant the sheriff's department money to purchase a new K-9: Trigger. "Trigger has been great for the department and for the community," says Mark Dexter, Trigger's handler. Along with stopping crime, Trigger has brought countless smiles to the faces of folks in the community – something Bryan would be proud of.

Donor advised funds allow donors an opportunity to support all of their varied philanthropic interests. Donors are welcome to actively participate in grantmaking to whatever extent they wish. A donor advised fund is an efficient and cost effective alternative to a private foundation.





WYCF AND THE WOLD FAMILY ARENA:

Facilitating Opportunity for the Community

ohn Wold's passion for hockey is as strong now, as it was during his Union College Days of the 1930's. A former varsity hockey player himself, Wold believes the teamwork and discipline the sport teaches goes beyond the arena and into the real world. The values hockey taught Wold were a huge part of his life, which is why he shared his and his family's dream of building a professional grade ice arena in Casper, with WYCF president, Craig Showalter and City Manager, John Patterson.


The Wold family envisioned a new arena would benefit Wyoming in a number of ways. It would bring in professional ice shows - exposing its young figure skaters to high caliber performers. A semi-professional hockey team could call Casper home as well. The biggest vision for use of the ice though, was providing youth teams, whose crammed practices were running as late as 10:00pm due to lack of ice space, with an additional venue.

WYCF recognized the impact Wold's dream could have on Wyoming's communities-from its youth programs to providing entertainment for families. The Foundation began facilitating a deal between the City of Casper and the Wold family which resulted in a commitment of \$1 million from the Wolds and additional \$1.9 million from the City of Casper to build an arena to be housed at the Casper Event's Center. In under a year the facility was built and is ready to use.

The Wold Family Ice Arena is already a huge success: youth hockey has more space, ice shows have been scheduled, and a deal to bring a semi-pro team to Casper is very close.

Craig Showalter, WYCF president, is proud to have helped make the Wold family's dream a reality. "We recognize that our donors are passionate about making a difference in the community. We make it a point to do everything we can to support those passions."

Today WYCF not only establishes funds and distributes grants, it is a conduit for building community.



SUBLETTE SUSTAINABILITY INITIATIVE:

Providing Nonprofits the Tools to Make a Difference

YCF knows the impact that a dollar makes to the livelihood of nonprofits. We also know thriving organizations are those who understand their role in the community and have a well-laid path for the future.

In 2014, the Wyoming Community Foundation partnered with Shell Oil and Gas Exploration Corporation to support a pilot project in Sublette County to assist nonprofits in mapping out a path for sustainability. The initiative provided organizations a six-month training - free-of-charge - to create thoughtful sustainability plans. Those who committed to the project would be eligible to earn grant money based on the quality of their plans. The training would be top-notch with The Foundation Center, a premier international organization for nonprofits, providing the majority of the training.

Twenty-one organizations participated and MESA Therapeutic Horsemanship came out as one of the front-runners in the category of nonprofits with an operating budget of under \$100,000.

Carla Sullivan is the executive director of MESA, which provides horse-assisted activities and therapies to those with physical, mental and behavioral challenges. She has incredible success stories and the sustainability training helped her learn how to frame those stories for grantwriting and fundraising – two things integral to success in the nonprofit world. Sullivan also believes the training helped MESA better communicate the work they do. "It made us stop and think about what our goals are and gave us a new perspective." MESA's biggest goal is for a new building. WYCF believes that with the work the group devoted to creating a solid sustainability plan, their goal will be reached.



Local Boards and Advisory Committees

WYCF Local Boards are made up of thoughtful individuals who recognize needs in their community, encourage partnerships and initiate activities to benefit their region. They work together to make a difference. WYCF works hand-in-hand with local boards as they review grant applications and implement asset development plans to foster growth. Established in 2008, WYCF – Dubois advises on two funds impacting nonprofits in the Dubois and Crowheart areas. In 2014 WYCF-Dubois was challenged to raise \$10,000 which would be matched by the WYCF state board. Three local donors also committed \$15,000 if the challenge was met. Because of community support, WYCF-Dubois reached their goal and will have \$35,000 to distribute in 2015.

here are thousands of people working across Wyoming to make our state a better place. They are the nonprofit heroes – organizations, individuals and businesses – who ensure worthy causes are given a voice. The Wyoming Community Foundation hosts Wyoming Philanthropy Days (WPD), as a way to support those who are working to build better communities.

Nonprofits have a tremendous impact on communities, which is why Philanthropy Days was first created. In 1994 WPD was an informal forum for philanthropists and nonprofits to network and generate ideas, and to discuss Wyoming's needs.

Philanthropy Days continues to offer the opportunity for grantmakers, grantseekers and donors to come together. As attendee Rae Lynn Job noted, "The networking that takes place will lead to long term working relationships among organizations that will ultimately benefit the people of Wyoming." It goes beyond that though, to include exceptional opportunities for professional development. Attendees walk away from the conference motivated and armed with the tools to create change.

The Wyoming Community Foundation believes in Wyoming Philanthropy Days. It connects people and gives nonprofits the tools they need to succeed, meaning we are all working together to build a better Wyoming.

WYCF hosted its FIRST Wyoming Philanthropy Days in 1994.

The event was held in Casper FIRST with its FIRST attendees totaling approximately 120.
